

RESOLUTION OF THE
 WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

Be it resolved by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe in regular session this 3d day of February, 1942, that

WHEREAS, there has been great damage to farms and range lands through erosion caused by unusual floods during the past year severely endangering homes along the streams, and

WHEREAS, we have been advised by those in charge of soil erosion and the Superintendent that it is not probable that funds from these sources will be available to any great extent during the next few years, and as it is imperative that protective work along streams be carried on as soon as is reasonably possible,

Be it resolved that the Secretary of the Interior be requested to approve the expenditure of \$8,000 from Tribal Funds to carry on the above mentioned protective work with native materials such as cedar and juniper timbers and rock, with such equipment as is available through CCC and Roads to expedite this work.

Local Indian labor and local supervision through the regular agency personnel will be used. A limited amount of woven wire will be furnished if available.

The foregoing resolution was on January 12, 1942 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against, by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article IV, Section 1 (d) and (e) of the Constitution and By-laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on August 15, 1938 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on August 26, 1938 pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
