

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

Be it resolved by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe in special session this date, July 20, 1942, that:

Whereas, there are large quantities of minerals such as manganese and asbestos on the southwest corner of the reservation which are badly needed for war work, and

Whereas, these minerals are located between ten and twelve miles inland from any highway and it is impossible to transport them to a good highway and railroad without the construction of approximately fourteen miles of gravel road.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Superintendent is hereby directed to take up this matter with the proper authorities to secure the necessary funds for the immediate construction of roads to the asbestos and manganese mines; that he make it an Indian Service project for Indian labor using such equipment as may be available from the CCC, Agency and Roads Department.

The foregoing resolution was this 20th day of July, 1942, duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Section 1 (a), Article VI of the Constitution and By-laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on August 15, 1938, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on August 26, 1938, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934, (48 Stat. 984).
