

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribal Council believes that scientific predator and rodent control on the Fort Apache Reservation is absolutely necessary for good wildlife management, and

AND WHEREAS, the United States Department of the Interior Fish and Wildlife Service is authorized by the Act of March 2, 1931 (46 Stat. 1468), the Act approved August 4, 1946 (60 Stat. 1080) to provide assistance to and cooperate with States, individuals, public and private agencies, organizations and institutions in the control of predatory animals and rodents injurious to agriculture, horticulture, forests, animal husbandry and wild game,

IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the Chairman be directed and authorized to enter into an agreement whereby a program for control of predatory animals and rodent pests will be undertaken on the Fort Apache Reservation, under the supervision of the Fish and Wildlife Service and in accordance with the latest improved methods and practices and correlated so far as possible with predatory animal control programs carried on in adjacent areas.

The foregoing resolution was on July 17, 1956 duly adopted by a vote of 7 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe pursuant to authority vested in it by Article VI, Section 1 (a) of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe on August 15, 1933 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on August 26, 1933 pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 13, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
