

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the Forest Service and the State Highway Department has recently improved the road from Apache Springs to Big Lake turnoff on the road to Maverick, and
- WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribe has recently established several recreational lakes and facilities in and around Reservation Ranch and Maverick, and
- WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribal Council feels that it would be of mutual benefit to all the people utilizing the areas, including lumber companies, tourists, vacationists, and
- WHEREAS, there is a definite probability that the Apache National Forest and the White Mountain Apache Tribe will further develop the area including winter sports, ski runs, wilderness areas and fishing resorts, and
- WHEREAS, U. S. Senator Carl Hayden, Congressman George F. Senner, Jr., Arizona State Senator, Walter Pulsipher have shown a keen interest in the establishment of this road.

BE IT RESOLVED that the U. S. Forest Service is hereby requested to utilize to its utmost, Forest Excess Road Funds to realign and service approximately twenty-two (22) miles of road beginning at the Big Lake turnoff to the town of Maverick.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tribal Council further consent that the reservation portion of this road become part of the State system.

The foregoing resolution was on November 10, 1965 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
