RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, permanent employment on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation is subject to seasonal fluctuations due to a dependence on the timber and tourism industries, and
- WHEREAS, the industrial development of the reservation requires the preliminary expenditure of funds in order to provide facilities basic to any industrial operation, and
- WHEREAS, private development capital is not available, and
- WHEREAS, the high unemployment and underemployment rates can only be lowered through development of a more diversified industrial economy, and
- WHEREAS, the various projects itemized in the 10-year Planning Report of the Fort Apache Indian Reservation could, if implemented, alleviate the employment problems of the reservation, and
- WHEREAS, the economy of the reservations environs will also benefit from industrial development on the reservation.
- BE IT RESOLVED that federal funds for industrial development on Indian Reservations be made available through more realistic sources and under more reasonable terms then are presently in operation.

The foregoing resolution was on December 8, 1966 duly adopted by a vote of 7 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
