

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the State Highway on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation has old and unfinished fencing and, as a result, livestock roam the highway right-of-way; thereby, creating serious traffic hazards which result in loss of livestock and death or injury to occupants of motor vehicles involved in collisions with livestock, and

WHEREAS, the State of Arizona has offered (1) to provide the necessary materials to fence State Highway right-of-way on Arizona State Highway 73 over a three-year period; (2) to stake right-of-way; (3) to provide instructions to supervisors in fence construction, and


WHEREAS, it will be necessary for the White Mountain Apache Tribe to provide labor and supervisors to construct the fences, and


WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribal Council recognizes the serious traffic hazards involving livestock and motor vehicles on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation and the desires to reduce or eliminate these hazards.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the necessary funds for labor and supervision will be furnished for the constructing of said fence.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the State of Arizona will: (1) provide all necessary materials; (2) furnish line stakes; (3) furnish instructors to the supervisors; (4) maintain the fencing when complete.

The foregoing resolution was on March 1, 1972 duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) & (j) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
