

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the Central Tribe is this year experiencing considerable difficulty in providing funds for continuing support of its various tribal programs, and

WHEREAS, this year there is an additional need to support certain tribal enterprises that, if given support, can return to the tribe increased income and more jobs in the immediate future; therefore, becomes necessary to eliminate certain expenditures that do not appear to be gaining the Tribe an advantage or a return on funds invested, and

WHEREAS, the functions of the position of Legislative Coordinator are actually overlapping with established elements of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, with the Department heads interested in specific legislation bearing on their interests, and by the efforts of our Public Relations contractor.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the position of Legislative Coordinator be abolished, effective June 8, 1972.

The foregoing resolution was on June 8, 1972 duly adopted by a vote of 5 for and 2 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1950 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 20, 1950, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 10, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
