

RESOLUTION OF THE  
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE  
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, there has been a substantial cut in the bureau education budget, and

WHEREAS, the students enrolling in the bureau schools has been steadily increasing over the years, and

WHEREAS, the education of the Indian children is a vital necessity in order to raise the standard of living of Indian people, and


WHEREAS, because of the lack of education and training the Indian people have the highest unemployment rate of any minority group in the United States, and

WHEREAS, a cut in the education funds would only worsen the unemployment and already existing poverty on the reservations.

BE IT RESOLVED that our Congressional Delegation be implored to seek a restoration and increase of all funds relating to education of Indians on reservations.

The foregoing resolution was on November 1, 1972 duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
