

## RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the tribe only received the final draft of the newly adopted Law and Order Code some two weeks ago, and
- WHEREAS, the short period of time is not sufficient for the tribe to give the code the needed study, and
- WHEREAS, in order for the code to be adopted, it has to be posted for at least ten days and thereafter adopted by the Tribal Council, and
- WHEREAS, if and when it is adopted by the Tribal Council, it has to be forwarded through the Bureau of Indian Affairs channels for its approval, and
- WHEREAS, it is estimated that it will take some ninety (90) days to accomplish all of the above-requirements, and
- WHEREAS, the tribe has been advised that, unless the code has been fully adopted by the first day of December, 1973, that all unspent funds allocated for said code will revert back to the government, and
- WHEREAS, the tribe has been informed that the Gila River Tribe, the Colorado River Tribe have been granted at least three additional extensions to complete the study and adoption and approval of the code.
- BE IT RESOLVED that the Arizona Justice Planning Assistance and/or Law Enforcement Assistance Administration is hereby requested to grant an extension of ninety (90) days from December 1, 1973 to study, adopt and for bureau approval of the amendment of the Law and Order Code Grant No. 72-245-7.

The foregoing resolution was on November 27, 1973 duly adopted by a vote of 6 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
