RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, there has been a problem with smoke from burning of forest debris caused by logging and natural causes, and
- WHEREAS, the U. S. Forest Service in the Southeast has had success in minimizing the problems of smoke by control burning conditions, and
- WHEREAS, they are willing to conduct a study on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation to set burning conditions to minimize smoke.
- BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that this study of three (3), forty-acre blocks can be conducted on the reservation with no cost to the White Mountain Apache Tribe and the results of the study will be made available to the Tribe.

The foregoing resolution was on February 2, 1977 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (1) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
