


RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe is informed of a technical proposal between the John Hopkins University and Dr. R. Bradley Sack, M.D., Sc.D., to provide for the study of the causes, and possible prevention, of diarrheal disease, and
- WHEREAS, Dr. Sack has presented to the Council his request to undertake his contractual obligations in this regard by conducting such a study among the population of tribal members on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation, and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council is informed that such study is pertinent to tribal members by reason of a reportedly high incidence of diarrhea on the Reservation, and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council is also advised that such study may lead to the development of a vaccine to prevent some types of diarrhea, but that tribal members shall not be used for testing of any kind for such purposes under this proposed study.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby endorses the undertaking of a technical proposal between the John Hopkins University and Dr. R. Bradley Sack, M.D., Sc.D., which would provide for the study of the causes, and possible prevention, of diarrheal disease among tribal members, on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation, as presented to the Tribal Council.


The foregoing resolution was on June 4, 1980 duly adopted by a vote of 10 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
