

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council unanimously authorized the posting of a proposed ordinance which would have the effect of repealing Ordinance No. 107, and

WHEREAS, said proposed ordinance repealing Ordinance No. 107 was posted by the Secretary of the Tribal Council for a period of ten (10) days as required by the Constitution and By-Laws of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, and

WHEREAS, there has been no oral or written opposition to the passage of the proposed ordinance and the Tribal Council further concluding that there exists good cause for the enactment of the proposed ordinance.


BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that Ordinance No. 126 which will repeal No. 107 which is attached to this resolution and incorporated by reference is hereby enacted effective March 05, 1982.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council hereby refuses that this Ordinance effectively repeals No. 107 and Ordinance No. 107 has no effect for 1982 Tribal Elections and for all future elections subject to amendment or revision by the Tribal Council.

The foregoing resolution was on March 24, 1982 duly adopted by a vote of 6 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).




The Tribal Council at its meeting of March 04, 1982, was approached by Mr. Reno Johnson, Sr., requesting that Ordinance No. 107, affected him individually and his position as Chief of Police involving his political activity. He feels that this is unjust, not fair, to only one candidate; and his request was concurred with by majority of the Tribal Council members. It was felt that such an ordinance should affect all the candidates running for political offices; and that this was discriminatory and unfair for one individual. Therefore, all were agreeable to repealing said ordinance No. 107 as soon as possible and recommendation was that it be posted for ten days and to be finally passed at the March 17, 1982 meeting that had been scheduled for other pressing matters to come before the council. (Excerpt: Lafe Altaha moved, seconded by Reno Johnson for the proposed ordinance to be posted for ten days and final passage on March 17, 1982 and carried nine for and none against.)

The Ordinance repealing Ordinance No. 107 was posted for more than ten days and received no oral or written opposition from the public; but, inadvertently, was not handled for final passage on March 17, 1982 meeting.



At the March 09, 1982 Special Tribal Council Meeting, the Tribal Council directed Special Counsel, William H. Veeder to draft a resolution which would require the Secretary of the Interior and Attorney General of the United States to withdraw its proposed water claims allegedly being made on behalf of the White Mountain Apache Tribe by those two officials.

The grounds for the resolution was that the proposed claim made by the Attorney General was grossly inadequate, based on spurious factual data, lacked professionalism and would result in a taking of the vast majority of the Tribe's water rights to the Salt River and its tributaries.

It has taken a considerable amount of time for Mr. Veeder to amast all of the necessary information to be attached to the resolution and he has personally delivered the results for his extensive research and preparation in the drafting of the final resolution on April 15, 1982.

It is extremely important that the Tribal Council act expeditiously to give its final approval to the attached resolution so that it can be distributed to the Congressional Delegation before the next Tribal Council Meeting.
