

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the Job Training Partnership Act, (JTPA), has filed a proposal with the Tribal Council for the construction of HIP homes in 1984, commencing June 4, 1984; and

WHEREAS, a detailed proposal is attached with this resolution and incorporated by reference for the construction of the 1984 HIP homes by JTPA; and

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council, after review of the proposal and discussion with the JTPA Director, concludes that the JTPA proposal is sound and will not only provide jobs, work experience and training for approximately 60 tribal youths between the ages of 16-20 years but will also result in the construction of 14-17 homes at a very reasonable price for those tribal members who are in dire need of housing.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby approves the JTPA proposal for the construction of the 1984 homes as attached hereto.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tribal Chairman is hereby authorized to execute any and all documents necessary to effectuate the construction proposal.


The foregoing resolution was on November 2, 1983, duly adopted by a vote of 8 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (b,h,i,j) of the Amended Constitution and By-laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).

JTPA Proposal for the Construction
of the 1984 HIP Homes

Since 1980 the CETA Program has utilized youth program funds to build HIP homes during the summer months. Totally, we have built 25 homes across the reservation. The rationale used in coordinating HIP funds and CETA funds are as follows:

- (1) More homes can be built, since HIP funds would be used mainly for the purchasing of materials and supplies, and vehicular expenses. For example, this past summer (1983) the CETA Program built six (6) houses at a total cost of \$57,933.27.

The cost per unit charged to HIP funds is \$9,655.55. This cost includes all materials, appliances, wood burning stoves (built by youth workers), and vehicle and mileage expenses. In comparison, Apache Development Enterprise estimated costs of \$15,388.00 per unit in 1983.

- (2) Valuable skills are learned by the youth. Under the CETA Program we hire inschool youth between the ages of 16-20 years. All students beginning work with the HIP Program usually do not have any skills. At the end many youths have learned valuable skills that have enabled them to obtain jobs in the building construction area after graduation.
- (3) Meaningful work experience is provided for the youths that will increase the employability for the youths who have no definite occupational goals and no job training.
- (4) In allowing inschool youths to build the homes we have been able to coordinate with Alchesay High School for the use of the Shop Area at no costs to the Program.

This year the CETA Program spent \$68,196.06 in labor costs (including fringe benefits) for the hiring of one (1) Coordinator, five (5) worksite supervisors, two (2) HIP aides, one (1) clerical worker, and thirty-seven (37) youths.

Program Plan for 1984

Beginning June 4, 1984, one (1) Coordinator, ten (10) supervisors, and

three (3) HIP aides, and approximately 60 youths between the ages of 16 - 20 years will be hired to work under the JTPA/HIP project. The project will last about eleven (11) weeks and end approximately August 20, 1984. Project funds for hiring the personnel will be obtained from the JTPA Title IV-A, IIA, IIB, and SYETP programs. Estimated costs for labor will be approximately \$137,616.26. HIP funds will be used specifically for the costs of materials and supplies, and vehicle expenses.

Should the Tribal Council allow the JTPA Program to administer the HIP contract for 1984, we will be able to build approximately 14-17 homes at an estimated cost of \$11,500 per unit. The number of homes that can be built is dependent on the amount of carryover monies left from the 1983 contract and if the Tribe will be receiving the 13.1% indirect costs from the BIA.
