

RESOLUTION OF THE
WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE
FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council, by Resolution No. 85-197 adopted on August 7, 1985, appointed Mr. Ray M. Counts as the Tribal Administrative Manager, and

WHEREAS, the Tribal Council appointed Mr. Counts as the Tribal Administrative Manager based upon information it received from Mr. Counts and his resume which failed to disclose that he had a health problem which may interfere with the grave responsibilities and duties expected to be performed by the Tribal Administrative Manager, and


WHEREAS, the Tribal Council concludes that it is in the best interest of the Tribe, its Business Office, that it rescind its previous action appointing Mr. Counts as the Tribal Administrative Manager and readvertise the position.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby rescinds Resolution No. 85-197 in its entirety, effective immediately.


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby directs the Department of Personnel to readvertise the position of the Tribal Administrative Manager.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council that it hereby requests the Department of Personnel to provide the council with a reference check of those applicants who are to appear before the Tribal Council prior to their personal interview with the Tribal Council.

The foregoing resolution was on August 14, 1985 duly adopted by a vote of 9 for and 0 against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (i) of the Amended Constitution and By-Laws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958 and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
