RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, during the past two years the number and magnitude of grievous fire and emergency rescue incidents occuring on the Fort Apache Indian Reservation have increased dramatically, and
- WHEREAS, the White Mountain Apache Tribal Council must not delay in providing more adequate fire-fighting and rescue facilities and personnel; and
- WHEREAS, immediate plans and applications are now being instituted which would greatly enhance local reservation capabilities in these direly needed service areas; and
- WHEREAS, the construction of a centralized fire fighting facility requires the tribe to submit and set aside a parcel of land whereon the facility shall be located.
- THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED in this Council and public meeting of January 20, 1988 with the full concurrence of council members present that as part of its participation in the HUD-Indian CDBG application process the White Mountain Apache Tribal Council through this resolution, and attached plat and legal description (Exhibits A-B) hereby secures, sets aside, and donates the large and adequate parcel of land in the Seven Mile settlement in the immediate proximity of the Community Center.

The foregoing resolution was on January 20, 1988, duly adopted by a vote of $\overline{\text{TEN}}$ for and $\overline{\text{ZERO}}$ against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache $\overline{\text{Tribe}}$, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (a) & (b) of the Amended Constitution and Bylaws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
