RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, it has been determined that a new Main Station is necessary "from the ground up" to support the minimum fire protection needs of the most populated areas of the reservation; and
- WHEREAS, the B.I.A. has made known its intention to use the present BIA property at an early date in the future; and
- whereas, as part of the concept of developing fire-protection capability within the Tribal Government a new location with a new and adequate Main Station is absolutely essential; and
- WHEREAS, the best location has been determined to be the present American Legion Site because it represents an ideal central location from which response to emergency situations can most easily be managed; and
- WHEREAS, the American Legion Chapter has met and freely gives up the land for this very worthy use forever; and
- WHEREAS, this approximate parcel of land is very adequate for erecting this proposed Main Fire Station, being approximately 220 Ft. by 220 Ft. (with a legal description, etc., to follow);
- BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the land is accepted back from the American Legion on the Reservation for the sole and exclusive purpose of creating a modern Main Fire Station with appropriate fire-fighting equipment.

The foregoing resolution was on February 13, 1989, duly adopted by a vote of TEN for and ZERO against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section (i) of the Amended Constitution and Bylaws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
