RESOLUTION OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

- WHEREAS, Roberta Leslie, a tribal member has brought to the attention of the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe the termination of 29 employees in the Bureau of Indian Affairs Forestry Department which action was taken without warning, without opportunity to be heard, without opportunity to fact the accusers and without a written hearing affording the employees due process of law; and
- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe supports wholeheartedly the quest of said employees for due process and a fair opportunity to be heard.
- BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache that if fully supports the Bureau of Indian Affairs Forestry employees who have been laid off in their quest for due process and a fair opportunity and hearing on their employment termination; and
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the appropriate congressional delegates be contacted and their assistance sought to secure due process for said terminated Bureau of Indian Affair employees.

The foregoing resolution was on October 11, 1989, duly adopted by a vote of SIX for and ZERO against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to authority vested in it by Article V, Section 1 (a & c) of the Amended Constitution and Bylaws of the Tribe, ratified by the Tribe June 27, 1958, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on May 29, 1958, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).
