Resolution No. 05-2012-68

(Enactment of Ordinance No. 241, Amending the Housing & Construction Code of the White Mountain Apache Tribe)

- WHEREAS, the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe ("Tribe") is entrusted by the Tribe's Constitution to act in all matters that concern the welfare of the Tribe, to manage all economic affairs and enterprises of the Tribe, and to regulate subordinate organizations for economic and other purposes; and
- WHEREAS, on November 14, 2011 the Tribal Council authorized the posting of Ordinance 241, which contained proposed amendments to the White Mountain Apache Tribe Housing & Construction Code, as set forth in Ordinance No. 241 attached hereto and incorporated by reference; and
- WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 241 proposes changes to Sections 1.2, 1.3, 2.2, 2.3, 3.2, 3.3, 4.2, 4.3, 4.5, 5.2, 5.3, 5.5, moving Chapter Six to Chapter Eleven, moving Chapter Seven to Chapter Twelve, moving Chapter Eight to Chapter Thirteen, and creating a new Chapter Seven, Eight, Nine and Ten; and
- WHEREAS, on November 22, 2011 Ordinance 241 was posted and since that time the Office of the Tribal Council Secretary has not received any comments regarding the proposed changes; and
- WHEREAS, the Council has reviewed proposed Ordinance No. 241 carefully and considered all recommendations and implications thereof in great detail and finds the adoption of updated housing and construction codes to be in the best interest of the Tribe.
- **BE IT RESOLVED** by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that proposed Ordinance 241, attached hereto and incorporated by reference, which amends Sections 1.2, 1.3, 2.2, 2.3, 3.2, 3.3, 4.2, 4.3, 4.5, 5.2, 5.3, 5.5, moving Chapter Six to Chapter Eleven, moving Chapter Seven to Chapter Twelve, moving Chapter Eight to Chapter Thirteen, and creating a new Chapter Seven, Eight, Nine and Ten of the Housing & Construction Code, is hereby adopted.
- **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby directs that in the event that this Resolution conflicts with a prior Resolution or Policy, this Resolution shall supersede and govern over the conflicting subject matter.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that it hereby directs that in the event this Resolution directly conflicts with the Tribal Constitution, Tribal Ordinances or Federal Laws, this Resolution shall be declared null and void and have no legal effect. This Resolution shall not be subject to Judicial Interpretation, only the Tribal Attorney, with the assistance of the Tribal Council Secretary, may opine on Tribal Council intent and the meaning of the language as used herein.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe that the Chairman, or in his absence, the Acting Chairman, is hereby authorized to execute any and all documents necessary to effectuate the intent of this Resolution. In the event that the Chairman fails to delegate signatory authority to an Acting Chairman, the Vice-Chairman may sign provided that the Tribal Secretary and a Tribal Attorney attest to the veracity of the subject matter of this Resolution.

The foregoing resolution was on MAY 30, 2012 duly adopted by a vote of SEVEN for and ZERO against by the Tribal Council of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, pursuant to the authority vested in it by Article IV, Section 1 (a), (q), (s), (t) and (u) of the Tribal Constitution, ratified by the Tribe September 30, 1993, and approved by the Secretary of the Interior on November 12, 1993, pursuant to Section 16 of the Act of June 18, 1934 (48 Stat. 984).

ORDINANCE OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE OF THE FORT APACHE INDIAN RESERVATION

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE WHITE MOUNTAIN APACHE TRIBE Ordinance No. 241, amending White Mountain Apache Housing & Construction Code to amend or add Sections 1.2, 1.3, 1.5, 2.2, 2.3, 2.5, 3.2, 3.3, 3.5, 4.2, 4.3, 4.5, 5.2, 5.3, 5.5, Chapter Six, Chapter Seven, Chapter Eight, Chapter Nine, Chapter Ten, Chapter Eleven, Chapter Twelve and Chapter Thirteen, as follows:

SECTION 1.2 ADOPTION OF UNIFORM BUILDING CODE

The Uniform Building Code, 1964 Edition, of the International Conference of Building Officials 2006 International Building Code of the International Code Council and any amendments thereto, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Superintendent, Fort Apache Agency, and the Chairman of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, is approved.

SECTION 1.3 <u>EFFECTIVE AREAS</u>

The Uniform Building Code, 1964 Edition, 2006 International Building Code shall be effective in certain areas to be designated by the Tribal Council.

SECTION 1.5 <u>VIOLATION; PENALTY</u>

Any person, firm, or corporation, violating any of the provisions of this Code shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and each such person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation of any of the provisions of this Code is committed, continued, or permitted, and upon conviction of any such violation such person shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$300.00 or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION 2.2 <u>ADOPTION OF UNIFORM PLUMBING CODE</u>

The Uniform Plumbing Code, 1964 Edition, of the Western Plumbing Officials Association 2006 International Plumbing Code of the International Code Council, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Superintendent, Fort Apache Agency, and the Chairman of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, is approved.

SECTION 2.3 <u>EFFECTIVE AREAS</u>

The Uniform Plumbing Code, 1964 Edition, 2006 International Plumbing Code shall be effective in certain areas to be designated by the Tribal Council.

SECTION 2.5 VIOLATION; PENALTY

Any person, firm, or corporation, violating any of the provisions of this Code shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and each such person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation of any of the provisions of this Code is committed, continued, or permitted, and upon conviction of any such violation such person shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$300.00 or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION 3.2 ADOPTION OF UNIFORM HOUSING CODE

SECTION 4.2 ADOPTION OF UNIFORM ELECTRICAL CODE and imprisonment.

Any person, firm, or corporation, under the jurisdiction of the Tribal Court, violating any of the provisions of this Code shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and each such person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation of any of the provisions of this Code is committed, continued, or permitted, and upon conviction of any such violation such person shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$300.00 or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION 5.2 <u>ADOPTION OF FIRE PREVENTION CODE</u>

The Fire Prevention Code, 1965 Edition, of the American Insurance Association, 2006 International Fire Code of the International Code Council, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Superintendent, Fort Apache Agency, and the Chairman of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, is approved.

SECTION 5.3 <u>EFFECTIVE AREAS</u>

The Fire Prevention Code, 1965 Edition, 2006 International Fire Code shall be effective in certain areas on the reservation. Such areas to be designated by the Tribal Council.

SECTION 5.5 VIOLATION; PENALTY

Any person, firm, or corporation, under the jurisdiction of the Tribal Court, violating any of the provisions of this Code shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and each such person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation of any of the provisions of this Code is committed, continued, or permitted, and upon conviction of any such violation such person shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$300.00 or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

B. The Tribal Council considers it necessary to have a Uniform Mechanical Code in order to accomplish the above objectives.

C. A Uniform Mechanical Code is considered necessary and in compliance with the reservation program and comprehensive neighborhood planning.

SECTION 7.2 ADOPTION OF MECHANICAL CODE

The 2006 International Mechanical Code of the International Code Council, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Superintendent, Fort Apache Agency, and the Chairman of the White Mountain Apache Tribe, is approved.

SECTION 7.3 EFFECTIVE AREAS

The 2006 International Mechanical Code shall be effective in certain areas on the reservation. Such areas to be designated by the Tribal Council.

SECTION 7.4 CONTRACTS

All future contracts, leases and agreements with persons not under the jurisdiction of the tribal court shall have incorporated therein an agreement to abide by this code.

SECTION 7.5 VIOLATION; PENALTY

Any person, firm, or corporation, violating any of the provisions of this Code shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and each such person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation of any of the provisions of this Code is committed, continued, or permitted, and upon conviction of any such violation such person shall be punishable by a fine of not more than and imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Any person, firm, or corporation, violating any of the provisions of this Code shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and each such person shall be deemed guilty of a separate offense for each and every day or portion thereof during which any violation of any of the provisions of this Code is committed, continued, or permitted, and upon conviction of any such violation such person shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$300.00 or by imprisonment for not more than ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.
